Covid, flooded basements, and a punctured water heater later, we are still here. But there were also many highlights! Take-out dinners, two German Beer Tastings, two Oktoberfests, and resuming concerts - we persevered and stood our ground. As most of you know by now, I did not run for president again. This does not mean that I will never run again, I just need a break. Nevertheless, I will still remain involved in the dealings of our organization as the new Recording Secretary. This position opened up because someone stepped up and accepted the challenge as president - Annette Hofmann, our current Recording Secretary. I would like to end this President's Message with some good news from the Pacific Ocean. A team of Dutch activists have shown great success with their Ocean Cleanup system. Since the employment of the second version of their device in August of last year they have collected 220,000 lbs. of garbage spanning 1160 square miles - roughly the size of Rhode Island. While this does not seem like much given the patches total size of 620,000 square miles - roughly twice the size of Texas - version 3 of the team's device will be able to clean up at about ten times the speed.

FROM THE ARCHIVES by Bruce Wolf, Archivist/Historian

After recently having a wonderful Christkindlmarkt of our own, I thought I would share a little history on these events. Christmas markets have been a German tradition since the mid-1500s. They were a highly anticipated event that brought joy and laughter to a cold, dark season. Music of Christmas filled the crisp cold air as well as the aroma of sizzling sausages, sweet pastries and hot spiced glühwein. Each town had a unique market with local tradesmen as well as locally produced food and beverages. Religious reformer Martin Luther suggested children receive their presents from the Christ Child, "Christkindl". Christkindl is a fairy-like being, dressed in white and gold with golden hair and a golden crown and is the German equivalent of Santa Claus. Today's markets are much the same as they have been for hundreds of years. They are a great way to KINDLE your Christmas spirit.

Hildegard Frey Edling has been a critical part of the Chor's Newsletters. She was either editor or assistant editor since 2000, and almost always a contributor. Since 1992 her great suggestions and ideas enhanced their contents.

Born in Manhattan, she moved to Tivoli at age 3. Her little school had no Kindergarten, so she started first grade when she was only 4 ½. The school was so small there were two grades in one room, and her grade school graduating class had only seven members. Hildegard's father owned Frey's Florist and Nursery in Tivoli from the mid-1940s until 1990. Of course she helped out here and there. Many of the local estates purchased plants from Mr. Frey. Hildegard knew the last Livingston to live in the Clermont Historic Site, Honoria McVitty, who purchased vegetables from Hildegard's father. What a legacy.

Hildegard was a singer from 1970 to 1977, and rejoined in 1982. She and her family joined Germania Poughkeepsie in 1953 while Julius Hochmuth was director for both groups. Her mother was a soloist for both societies. Hildegard also played clarinet in a symphonette to accompany both choruses, especially for the extensive potpourri they sang.

Hildegard graduated from Red Hook Central School in 1960, then from Ulster County Community College with an AA-Liberal Arts/Humanities degree. She participated in Bard College's University Without Walls program in 1978 and received a BS in Social Studies. She also attained an Economic Development Specialist certification through a special program at Oklahoma State University.

Not one to be idle, Hildegard has been an active participant in many groups, such as the Red church Cemetery Association and Board of Directors of the Tivoli Free Library, having served as a volunteer for about 20 years. She coordinates their fiber arts group, Hooks & Needles, Yarns & Threads. She is currently a member of the Dutchess County Rug Hookers Guild and a deacon at the Livingston Memorial Church.

Hildegard and Richard married in 1987 and love to travel. Among their trips were the Falkland Islands, Amazon River/South America, Greenland and Iceland. One of their best trips was a National Parks tour in the Western USA.

Then there are their cats. If you get their message machine, Viertal will take your message. Hildegard told me that Viertal passed over the Rainbow Bridge in 2019 but remains the best voice on their machine. Now Phoebe reigns supreme and knows how to keep the Edlings in control.

Let me introduce you to **Annemarie Harms**, the creator and editor of the Maennerchor's Newsletter. She had the foresight many years ago to start our newsletter and has been editor for 12 years plus involvement in other capacities.

Annemarie was born in Leeste-bei-Bremen, a village due south of Bremen, on her father's long-established family farm. The family, mom, dad, brother and sister, came to the USA by ship when she was 2 ½ years old. It took about a week to cross the Atlantic. Although her father had reserved a cabin for the family, when they boarded, the men were separated from the women and children. For much of the trip she and her brother ran around the ship's deck with their noisy "klacker" toys.

The family moved to Esopus in 1957 when her father bought what became the "9W Hofbrau" which her parents operated until 1978. The whole family worked in that restaurant including her siblings and her grandmother. Annemarie says that growing up in a restaurant was the best "job training" in the world. And no, it was not easy.

Growing up in Esopus Annemarie attended a one-room school house during grades four to six. It was a special experience since it was so small (grades K - 6 with about 30 kids and one teacher) and like a big family. She graduated from Kingston High School, then Ulster County Community College where she attained an AA Liberal Arts degree. She also attended numerous training courses in various disciplines and earned certificates in several courses of study.

She attended Maennerchor concerts starting around 1981 when they were held at JW Bailey School. In February 1984 her father, Willi Harms, sponsored her as a singing member of the Maennerchor. She became very active, has served on the Executive Board for many years and currently is beginning her 15th year as Financial Secretary.

Now retired, Annemarie had a varied professional career. At one time she worked at the Ulster County Clerk's office and was a Principal Clerk at the time she left. From 1983-2007 she worked at Rondout Mfg. as an Administrative Assistant and Purchasing Agent. She later worked as Information Assistant for Ulster County Tourism where she assisted visitors, worked on content for the annual award-winning travel guides, was involved in many off-site events, and much more. After retirement she worked in the gift shop at the Hudson River Maritime Museum, with her last position as its manager. She was fortunate in those last two jobs in meeting people from all around the world. "So cool and interesting!"

Annemarie's two daughters live in Phoenix, Arizona. Her granddaughter, who is a sophomore at Arizona State University, teaches karate and just achieved her brown belt. Her goal is a black belt.

Among Annemarie's hobbies are reading, gardening/yard work, visiting museums and art galleries, as well as being an active member of her local Seniors club. Caring for "fur balls" aka cats are way up on her list of interests. In 2014, faced with seven kittens born in her back yard, she did TNR (trap/neuter/release) with assistance from Woodstock Feral Cat

Project grants on about 12 cats and kittens. After seven years one of the mama cats, Freckles, moved into her home. The other cats are feral, at least eight years old and thriving, and have insulated cat shelters and enclosed feeding areas.

Thank you Annemarie for all these years of hard work and diligence producing an exceptional newsletter.

We are RETIRING! It has been both a pleasure and a challenge but we hope that you have enjoyed the Newsletters over these past 31 years.
