PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello Friends of German Culture and Music!

I wish you all a happy, healthy, and fruitful 2022! Let us hope that this year will be better than the previous one. We have been going through some very rough 22 months and had some ups and downs. Overall, I would say: it could have been worse, and I am sure it will be even better.

Our organization lives and dies with the support of its members. It is by your participation, help, and support that we ensure the flourishing of the Kingston Maennerchor and Damenchor. Without you we will certainly not be around for a long time.

When reading through the newsletter and/or contacting Annemarie for the payment of your 2022 dues you will notice that we have raised our dues. The new dues are now \$45 per year for a standard membership, something that has not happened in more than a handful of years. The raise was long overdue, albeit it was a rather modest increase of only \$5 per year. However, this will not be a massive funds generator, but rather a small fluff to the money coming in.

Another way of helping this organization is the Adopt-a-Cost method. In this newsletter you will find an overview of recurring costs that can be "adopted" by members, a way of making sure that our costs are lessened by a small bit. We have tried this already and it worked. However, it seems to always be the same handful of people that chip in by adopting one of these expenses. I would be happy to see some other members contributing.

You can help out in other ways too. As most of you know, we try to have one big event per month, with the occasional double month or sometimes a skipped month. These events need people that help out, bring a dish, or even volunteer to fully chair an event. Like the adoption of a cost, it seems to always be the same familiar faces that run these events. Yes, it is a decent amount of work, but it is not undoable. And there is always the option of co-chairing with someone else. Please, take a look at the calendar of events included in this newsletter and see if you would like to (co-)chair one of them. We have members who have done this for many years that are more than happy to give guidance and advice. Some of those members have been doing it for so many years and are more than ready to step down from the lead roles of such events - and deservedly so. At the end of the day, it is definitely not an impossible undertaking. If everybody steps up by just a bit (offer to make 5 lbs. of potato salad, work 1 or 2 events a year, run one event, etc.), the burden will be less on those that "always do it" and everyone is willing to go on doing what they are doing. A system that relies on always the same few people is doomed to collapse!

Lastly, if you seem to be unable to do any of the above mentioned things, at the very least order a dish from a takeout or invite one or two extra friends to our events. When we had our Oktoberfest just a few months ago, I was appalled when I heard the pre-order numbers mere days before the event. One week before the event we had a grand total of only 10 (!) members for pre-order takeout or reserved seats - that included the ones

who were helping. Those were ridiculously low numbers and a slap in the face of those organizing the event. If it would not have been for Donna and Bruce Wolf's gamble of pre-ordering more chicken with the caterer and delaying the deadline by a few days (despite this causing massive headaches) the event would have been a big, fat minus in our books.

At the end of the January 2022 business meeting we will see Christa Scheitz stepping down from being our recording secretary for many (*Ed.: 2004 to 2021*) years. I would like to thank her very much for all those years! Thankfully, one of our newest members, Annette Hofmann, was willing to run for this position. We are looking forward to welcoming her on the Executive Board. I am happy that she was willing to run because it always seems such a hard task to find people to run for such positions. Yes, some offices do require more work than others. But generally speaking, there should not be a struggle to find people to fill the board.

That brings me to one last thing to talk about. I will not be running for president in the coming elections. This will be, for now, my last year as president. Think about whether you are interested in running for this position. The earlier you make that decision the better. This will mean more time to ask questions and to be involved in things to learn before my stepping down.

Of course, I will not end this message without some positive news. Although this is already a bit outdated, it is nevertheless a great piece of news. In 2019, the Pittsburgh based nonprofit organization 412 Food Rescue opened their first kitchen called the Good Food Project. They use groceries that are being discarded by stores to cook zero waste meals. These meals are being served to those in need through other nonprofit partners. Founded in 2015 by Leah Lizarondo, the organization saves millions of pounds of food from being dumped into landfills. (About 25% of all materials ending up in landfills are food waste.) With the help of an app the organization has spread to over 15 cities with 25,000 volunteers. This helped turn more than 70 million pounds of food into 57 million meals while simultaneously mitigating 30 million pounds of CO2.

LITERARY CORNER:

Our member Edith Borchardt continues her creative writing, which are often published in digital form. Enjoy her following submission.

In November of this fall (2021), Edith Borchardt, Professor Emerita of German at the University of Minnesota Morris, (re)published an autobiographical essay with the title "*Heimatbilder*" ["Pictures from My Homeland"] in the electronic journal *Glossen* (#48) as a complement to her contribution last spring, "*Grenzgebiete*," in *Glossen* #47 (May 2021), which deals with the topic of *Doppelidentitäten* [Double Identities] and cultural politics. The latest issue of *Glossen* also contains her review of Irmgard Hunt's *zueinander. Neue und alte Geschichten* (Leipzig: Engelsdorfer Verlag 2021). Professor Borchardt's short story, "*Die Astralreise*" ["Astral Travel"] appears in the 2021 fall issue of TRANS-LIT2, a peer reviewed journal published by SCALG, the Society for Contemporary American Literature in German.

"*Heimatbilder*" is an attempt to define the concept of "homeland" through her childhood experiences in Bavaria (Germany) and the Burgenland (Austria). It also contains adult recollections of visits in Vienna with relatives, exploring important monuments of modernism in art (like Gustav Klimt and Egon Schiele) and architecture (Otto Wagner and Josef Hoffmann): the Secession movement and *Jugendstil* (art deco). Her most recent story, "*Die Astralreise*," revolves around a clairvoyant dream.

ANOTHER RETIREMENT

As many of you know, Hans Safer was a long-time host of the German Hour on Radio Kingston, previously known as WKNY. He retired this fall after 35 years of dedication. You can still find two years of his archived programs on RadioKingston.org. I had a recent conversation to learn a little bit about his radio experience.

Some of you might remember Bill Henle, who was the previous host. Sadly, Bill became ill and passed away. The radio station WKNY continued to play German music, but, without a host, it was just not "the same". Hans had been translating commercials for a funeral home into German. One day, he received a call from Ward Todd, the station manager in the 1980s. Ward thought that with three German clubs the German Hour could continue with German-speaking hosts. Hans initially declined – he just was not interested and did not want to do it. Obviously, Hans eventually said yes!

Hans originally recorded programs at the station's studio, where big reels were used for taping. To the younger generation, it would look like the stone age. At first he bought much of the music and included music of German culture, such as Austria, Germany, and Switzerland. He played a mix of old and new music to satisfy his audience's diverse tastes. People started giving Hans records, often from family estates. Eventually, Hans was able to access a huge selection from the internet. From the station's studio to do programming Hans eventually moved his programming on a computer from his home.

Hans welcomed guests for interviews and as hosts. Among them were musicians Joe Unger and Ingo Froehlich, our members, the late Poldy Funccius (who reached 100) and Helga Bruening, and NYS Saengerfest 2018 co-chairs Hildegard Edling and Annemarie Harms.

What especially stands out to Hans was that many people told him "the German Hour was the happiest hour of the week". He kept doing the program because it "made so many people happy". What better legacy can one wish for as that? Many, many thanks for a great job - well done!
