### ***A LITTLE GERMAN IMMIGRANT HISTORY***

While doing some research on good ol' Google I came upon an interesting article in UntappedNewYork.com written by Julio Yarce, dated January 28, 2021. It was about Little Germany - Kleindeutschland, in Manhattan.

The first wave of German immigration was 1683 – 1775; the second wave was during the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Changes in maritime transportation across the Atlantic led to an era of mass migration, especially with the introduction of steamboats. From 1880 -1920, 5.5 million German immigrants entered via ports in NYC. The German population in 1880 NYC was 350,000, the third largest German-speaking city in the world after Berlin and Vienna. The German immigrants dominated some specialized occupations including shoemakers, furniture makers, furriers and brewer.

These immigrants were a heterogeneous group and included Catholics, Protestants, Jews, free thinkers and Forty-Eighters. These were political exiles from the 1848 Revolution from a multiplicity of German kingdoms and principalities.

Little Germany was also known by non-Germans as “Dutch Town”. According to the author, it consisted of 400 blocks, Ave. D to 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. and the Bowery, and from East 14<sup>th</sup> St. in the north and division St. in the South, later known as East Village. In your search engine enter Little Germany and learn so much more about this vibrant German community.

Famous buildings were Deutsche-Amerikanische Schuetzen Gesellschaft (Society), and the Ottendorfer Library. Tours are available at NYCgo.com.
