From the Archives

I would like to share a story of yesteryear taken from oral memoirs given by past member Pauline Kreisig. She and her husband Albert were both German immigrants who met at the Maennerchor's Rondout Social Hall and were soon married. Shortly afterward they started a moving business named Kingston Transfer Company. It was the first motor driven operation around while others still used horses, wagons and sleighs. In the cold dreary days of winter the Germania Singing Society in Poughkeepsie would set up dates for a winter dance. Being the early 1900s there were no bridges built yet. With the Hudson frozen solid the only mode of transportation was a floating chain-driven platform nicknamed the Skillypot. The Kreisigs were strong supporters of the German Dances and would clean out their moving truck and place long wooden benches inside for people to sit. The Skillypot would then pull the truck across the Rondout. The truck would then continue it's way on a dirt road from Port Ewen to Highland. The travelers, rattled and shaken, would then exit the vehicle and continue on foot the rest of the way. When there was no moonlight they would carry lanterns to light their way. The half-frozen group would finally arrive at Germania Hall where they would dance and sing into the early wee hours. When it was time to leave they faced the same journey home. Arriving back in Kingston they would have just enough time to change their clothes and be ready for Sunday morning church. These trips continued for some time until the erection of new bridges brought them to an end. If they could have only just called an UBER!!



The Riverside Ferry, which provided service between Rondout and Sleightsburgh by way of the Rondout Creek. Ferry service for this route was originally est. in 1850 by the descendants of John P. Sleight. The River-side in particular ran from 1870 until 1922. A chain resting on the bottom of the Rondout Creek passed through the ferry's machin-ery to provide propulsion. It was nicknamed "Skillypot" by locals, a Dutch word meaning turtle.

The committee has completed its deliberations and will be awarding 3 scholarships in the amount of \$500.00 each from the Männerchor and Damenchor. The winners are from Red Hook High School and Kingston High School.

1. Reilly Renée Michaud from Kingston High School received a scholarship for Excellence in Choral Singing and Individual Vocal Performance.

2. Olivia Martens and 3. Jillian Hunziker, both from Red Hook High School, received scholarships for Excellence in the Study of German and Music.

The three winners of scholarships from the Männerchor and Damenchor are:

Reilly Renée Michaud plans on attending Nazareth College in Pittsford, NY, formerly the Nazareth College of Rochester, to study Music Education with a focus on Voice. Having studied French already, she wants to minor in Italian and to study abroad. She has already traveled extensively in eight European countries. At Kingston High School, she enrolled in Choir for 3 years and Voice I, II, and III with a 7-song recital in June 2022. She participated in **Area All State** this year, performing the soprano 1 solo, "O Mio Babbino Caro" by Puccini and received a 99 on her **All-State solo** in April of last year. She also studies privately with her choir teacher Mr. Lohman.

Olivia Martens has been an excellent student of German in Middle School and at Red Hook High School. She composes and writes songs, loves piano music (Bach, Brahms). She plays guitar, flute, and piano: that was her foundation for song writing. She submitted a song to **NYSSMA Allstate** (New York State Schools Music Association) and was surprised that she won the Song Writers Competition. She was a finalist for the next two years. Wherever Olivia attends college, she intends to minor in Music Composition and intends to spend a year abroad in Germany. She wants to continue studying German and hopes to become fluent in it.

Jillian Hunziker's interests lie in music and language learning. She has been studying German for 5 years, in Middle School and at Red Hook High School. She plans to attend an American University in Europe to prepare for a possible career in International Relations and explore Germany and Europe. Jillian writes, produces, and performs music in her spare time. She began with singing in her church choir and caroling. She plays the guitar and piano and is a recorded artist, having released two original songs on all streaming platforms. She is the lead singer in "Chocolate Jam," a roots band that performs at gigs around the community. Her band prides itself in taking up gigs that promote involvement in the community, like at Four Corners Farm, Hardscrabble Festival, and the Community Center in Red Hook.
